The Youth Dreamers is a youthrun 501(c)3, non-profit organization whose goal is to decrease the amount of violence among youth in Baltimore City. The organization was founded by nine students in an elective course at the Stadium School in 2001. These students had witnessed violent acts among youth after school, so they decided to create a youth-run youth center where teenagers could be employed to mentor and teach younger children and programs could exist for the whole community. Since 2001, the students have formed their nonprofit organization with a board of youth and adults, purchased an old, vacant house from a church in the neighborhood, presented at the Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals, and worked with a probono architect and a pro-bono general contractor to design and

construct the house. They raised over \$800,000 towards construction and programming costs and mobilized a community to support them. They have partnerships with the University Of Maryland School Of Law, Stevenson University, Maryland Institute College of Art, the Shepherd's Clinic, and more.

Thirty middle school students in the Youth Dreamers' Project Class at the Stadium School basically manage the nonprofit—writing grants, organizing fundraisers, planning afterschool programs, organizing community events, etc. Additional middle school students are employed to work in their after school programs, such as Homework Club, Health Club and Community Art, and high school students are employed to

supervise these programs, as well as run our annual five-week summer program. The Youth Dreamers also have an Advisory Board, which comes up with creative ideas to keep the Dream House open. In 2010, the Dream House had its **Grand Opening!** Even though the dream has come true, the Youth Dreamers find it hard to keep it alive. They have to pay bills they've never paid before and they need additional funding to provide more programs. More determined than ever, they continue to work hard to keep their dream alive.

Oh, The Places You Will Go! Summer Arts Program 2010

The Youth Dreamers "Oh the Places You'll Go" Summer Program took place from June 28th to July 28th 2010 on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 10:00 am to 3:00 pm at the Dream House. We had 19 students from grades 5-9. This year we based the morning on creating this book about Baltimore—Baltimore, I Love You! Participants were taught different skills such as poetry writing, interviewing, journalism, and fundraising by peer high school students. Each participant wrote an identity poem and poetry about Baltimore,

in addition to working in teams to interview people from the community and writing their narratives. This book will give readers an inside view of the city we live in along with some facts about us. Participants worked with Maryland Institute College of

Art graduate students and three high school interns in the afternoon to do Community Art. During Community Art, the participants sewed three reusable bags out of donated tee shirts-one to sell, one for themselves, and another for the

for themselves, and another for the community. They also created their own



sketchbooks/journals and t-shirts to wear at Artscape. They painted window screens for the house as well as for the Shepherd's Clinic, the free health clinic next door. Every Friday was considered Ice Cream Friday. We ended each Friday eating ice cream cones, sucking on popsicles or biting into ice cream sandwiches. Based on evaluations, we will continue next year having the Summer Program. Attendance was great! The children seem to really like it—especially being in The Dream House.

About The Baltimore Love Project

The Baltimore Love Project expresses love by connecting people and communities across Baltimore City through love themed murals. (www.baltimoreloveproject.com)

A few years ago, local artist Michael Owen developed a design of four hands spelling out the word love. Now this image will be painted on 20 walls, spread evenly across the communities of Baltimore City. The murals will be identical in regards to content, only ranging in size.

This project is not intended to change the world. However, we know that these murals have the power to inspire change, if just through small, tangible acts of love from one to another. We hope a man is moved to pick up flowers for his girlfriend or a mother reconsiders hitting her child for a night. In order to assist in these expressions, the Baltimore Love Project remains an open ended project where we look to individuals and communities for their responses.
